Désirée McGraw has been described by the national media as "one of Canada's ten most influential people on environmental issues." She was among a select group of Canadians invited to complete private training with former US Vice-President Al Gore on the science and solutions of climate change. Wellness Tips

Does freezing or microwaving with plastic release dioxins? Stories have circulated for years claiming that plastic food containers or wraps release cancer-causing substances called dioxins. In fact, there is no evidence that plastic containers or wraps even contain dioxins. To ensure the safe use of plastic in the microwave, use containers, wraps or utensils only if they are labelled for either conventional or "microwave-safe" cooking. Very few plastics are safe to use in a conventional oven. Oven cooking bags may be used in both types of oven. Both oven cooking bags and their closure ties are made from heat-resistant nylon. They can be used in a microwave oven or in a conventional oven set not higher than 400 F. Microwave food in packaging materials only if the package so directs, and then use only one time. Materials suitable for microwaving include oven bags, wax paper and plastic wrap. Do not let the plastic wrap touch the food, and do not reuse the wrap. Do not use foam-insulated trays and plastic wraps used to package fresh meats in grocery stores. These types of plastic products should not be used in a microwave oven because they react to heat when thawing or reheating. To avoid a chemical migration problem, remove meats from their packaging. Plastic packaging materials should not be used at all in conventional ovens. They may catch fire or melt, causing chemical migration into foods. Plastic cold-storage containers such as margarine tubs, take-out containers, whipped topping bowls, and other one-time use containers should not be used in microwave ovens. Sometimes these materials are inadvertently cooked with a product. For example, giblets may be accidentally cooked inside the turkey in their packaging or a beef roast may be cooked with the absorbent pad from the fresh meat packaging underneath. However, if this happens and the packaging materials remain unaltered, the cooked meat will not pose an imminent health hazard. If the packaging materials have melted or changed shape in some other way, do not use the product.
