CFUW NEWS

CFUW ANNUAL REPORT 2014

CFUW members can reflect with pride on their achievements this year in the advancement of equality for women and girls. CFUW has been actively engaged for nearly ninety-six years in improving the human rights of women and girls, and although our strategies and methods may have varied over that time, our commitment to that mission remains unchanged.

This year we have focused on the development of five strategic aims for the organization - Advocacy, Fellowships and Scholarships, Membership, Sustainability and Public Profile.

In 2013/14, CFUW Clubs and the CFUW Fellowships Program awarded close to \$1 million for education. CFUW has been helping women pursue post-secondary studies for over 95 years since its inception in 1919.

CFUW demonstrates that women working together can be a powerful source of change.

Through our network of more than 100 Clubs across Canada working within their local communities, and supported by our regional and provincial councils, the CFUW national office and the International Federation of University Women (IFUW), we are helping build a more equitable world for women and girls. Together we are facilitating positive change locally, provincially, nationally and internationally so that the human rights of all girls and women are respected.

Advocating for policy changes to improve the lives of women and girls in Canada and around the world is fundamental to our work as an organization and network of Clubs.

We engage decision makers, like-minded organizations and the public to advance our membership's vision of a more just world.

Throughout 2013/2014, CFUW has participated in several consultations and events organized by the Government of Canada and the Official Opposition such as:

- The 2014 Pre-Budget Consultations, where CFUW highlighted the need to create a national action plan to address violence against women and girls, create a universal national early learning and child care program, and invest in women's job security and employment equity;
- Consultations with the Continuing Committee of Officials on Human Rights to discuss Canada's 2nd Universal Periodic Review of its international human rights commitments and input on the draft outline for Canada's eighth and ninth periodic reports on the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW);
- A forum on Best Practices for Supporting Women in Non-Traditional Sectors, held by Status of Women Canada and the Labour Program of Employment and Social Development Canada;
- The Women's Forum des Femmes which focused on issues affecting young women, organized by the Official Opposition Critic for Status of Women, Niki Ashton, M.P.;
- The NDP International Women's Day Breakfast; and
- Justice Canada's consultation on prostitution laws.

Regional/Provincial

During 2013-2014, CFUW's regional/provincial councils across the country were very active. The B.C. Council focused on Year 2 of their Poverty Initiative that is working toward reducing the number of

children and families living in poverty by carrying out projects in 23 communities and by petitioning the government to adopt and implement a poverty reduction policy.

Specific advocacy projects undertaken in the Prairie Region this biennium included - child poverty in Alberta; affordable housing for middle income seniors as well as other problems aggravated by the “booming economy” in Saskatchewan; and salt consumption, especially in restaurants in Manitoba.

The CFUW Ontario Council supported Children and Youth in Care as well as a public Integrated Transportation System.

The CFUW Quebec Council worked to support Aboriginal women in their educational initiatives while the Atlantic Council promoted a number of initiatives on the elimination of violence against women and girls including a petition against Non-State Actor Torture.

International

In August of 2013, CFUW led a delegation of 30 women to the 31st International Federation of University Women (IFUW) Conference in Turkey which had as its theme Women’s Role in Achieving a Sustainable Future: Education, Urbanization, Violence and Human Rights.

CFUW also led a delegation of 13 women at the 58th session of the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (UNCSW).

CFUW delegates presented a parallel event entitled Universal Primary Education By 2020: In Peril for Afghan Girls? and attended a variety of events, caucus meetings and general sessions on topics related to the priority theme, Challenges and Achievements in the Implementation of the Millennium Development Goals for Women and Girls.

We also offered our input on the Agreed Conclusions (i.e. the outcome document for the session) to Canada’s negotiators.

As a member of the IFUW, our Clubs raised over \$4,000 for IFUW’s Bina Roy projects to support women and girls in developing countries.

Fatoumata Coulibaly, single mother of three children, wrote in her application: "Ça serait un immense bonheur et de fierté que d'obtenir une première bourse d'études. Rien ne pourrait m'empêcher de poursuivre mes études."

This change of name reflects the change in focus of the Current and Emerging Issues interest group from research alone to more action-oriented activities, both on already identified issues, as well as others that may come up during the coming year. In other words, we would like to do more and talk less, through co-operation with other groups, outreach, both internal and external, through publicity in newsletters and newspapers, workshops, topical documentary films, participation in campaigns, letter-writing campaigns, and cooperation with other CFUW clubs.

The issues the group identified last year were:

The Quebec Charter of Human Values Bill 60-- took a lot of time but was resolved with the electoral defeat of the PQ.

Right to Die – ‘The ‘Dying with Dignity’’ bill fell when the election was called, but apparently remains a priority for the new government.

Financial Literacy for Women – The CFUW has already done a lot of work on this issue, and materials are available on their website.

Tax Credit for Seniors’ Fitness – A bill that would allow for a credit of up to \$500.00 for adults.

Children’s refugee rights – The detention of refugee children, the cuts to their health care, and today’s change in the definition of “dependent child” reducing the age from ‘under 22’ to under “18” cry out for advocacy with help from other groups.

Elimination of Violence against Women and Girls:

This is a high priority issue both locally and internationally. The CFUW is calling for a national action plan on this issue. <http://www.fcfd.org/enca/advocacypolicy/currentandupcomingissues.aspx>

The CFUW has also reviewed the UN Gender Equality Action Plan (GEAP).
